














Welcome to two new members of staff
















Morrisons' School Meal Packs


Everything a child needs for breakfast lunch and snacks for up to 7 days,


Bournes Green Junior School

A Selection of work for anti-bullying week

During anti-bullying week, our story focus was 'Day Monkey, Night Monkey' by Julia Donaldson. The two monkeys don't think they had much in common, but when they each spend time in the other's opposite worlds, they learn a lot. They also learn to be the best of friends and join each other as the sun goes down and their day begins or ends. After reading the story, the children created their own sunset pictures by colour mixing and added different types of homes that people may live in.



Our story focus was 'The Smeds and the Smoos' by Julia Donaldson. After reading the story, the children discussed why it is nice to have friends who are different and that it is ok to play with different friends throughout the day at school. We also discussed how we should use kind words to ensure we do not hurt each other's feelings. Within the story, Janet and Bill realise that even though they are different they want to be friends and go missing from their families to play together.



Oyster Class had been talking about what it means to be a bully. They identified people who can help us and made links to the Golden Rules, which we follow to keep us happy and safe at school.

Some time was spent exploring friendships, what makes a healthy friendship and what is an unhealthy friendship. They discussed how to solve friendship problems by using words and learning to compromise.



As part of Anti Bullying Week, Year 4 designed some posters against bullying. They talked about how bullying makes victims feel and how you can stand united against it.

One class made Support Network hand cut outs. Another made friendship bracelets in their 'Unite Against Bullying', each child having a strip to write on 5 messages of friendship which were then all joined together.
