Starfish Class

The Nursery have had an extremely busy week learning about Autumn. They went on an Autumn walk and used their senses to explore the outdoor classroom. They looked at how the leaves on the trees are changing colour and beginning to fall to



the ground. They then had a fun time picking blackberries which we then used in class to make blackberry playdough.

In class, the children investigated the Autumn tuff tray and used lots of words to describe the textures of the fir cones, leaves and conkers. They were also creative and used the conkers to paint and explore colour mixing.

They have also been learning about hedgehogs and other nocturnal animals that hibernate for the winter. They made hedgehog bread rolls and worked collaboratively on a piece of

leaf craft to create a giant picture of a hedgehog. Finally, we have been developing our fine motor skills by tapping golf tees into a pumpkin.





























Seahorse Class



This week, Seahorse Class have been exploring the topic of 'Our Senses'. We discovered we have 5 senses - touch, sight, taste, hearing and smell. We then matched each sense to the

body part we would use. We discussed that although we use our hands to touch, it is all our skin that can feel different sensations. In pairs, the children took part in a senses walk around the school grounds where they drew pictures which represented each sense. For our Art topic, we investigated

the Italian artist Giuseppe Acrimboldo who used fruit, vegetables, meat and fish to make portraits. The children used familiar and unfamiliar fruits and vegetables to make portraits, before eating their designs. In Maths, we

have looked at the 'numberness' of numbers to 4. We

have used the stem sentences of '1 and another 1 make', '1 and 1 and 1 altogether make' and '1 and 1 and 1 and another 1 altogether make'

before collecting objects to make 2, 3 and 4. This will help the children to understand that bigger numbers are composed of smaller numbers. We have also been exploring patterns and have completed a range of repeating patterns using colours, sizes and objects. To encourage oral health and the importance of having clean teeth. we discussed when and how we should be brushing our teeth. We discovered that we should

brush our teeth for 2 minutes, twice a day, every day, see a dentist every 6 months and not eat or drink too much sugar. In the builder's tray, the children used toothbrushes and toothpaste to brush the germs off laminated

teeth.

Oyster Class

This week in Oyster Class, we have been thinking about Autumn weather and how we dress as the days get cooler. We created our own people puppets wearing outfits suitable for this time of year. We made all the outfits individual just like us!



In Art, we have continued looking at mark making and exploring the work of Piet Mondrian. This week we looked at ways to use crayons to create a variety of




marks, applying light or firm pressure on the crayon and using different parts of it. We put our crayon skills to good use creating our tree pictures inspired by 'The Red Tree'.









In our English lessons this week, we have been creating our own rhyming poems based on the book Oi Frog by Kes Grey and Jim Field.






















Seagull Class

This week, Year 3 have really shown their artistic sides. They have created some brilliant multi-media collages of cave paintings. They began by using cotton wool to blur paint across their background to create the texture of the cave wall. They then used chalk pastilles to draw a selection of animals including bison, mammoths and sabre tooth tigers. These were then cut out and stuck on the background and their outline blurred with charcoal. The finished product is amazing! They then designed and made stone age beads out of clay using four basic styles: cubes, barrels, spheres and teeth. Hopefully they will be able to wear these at their workshop. 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
Curlew Class

In our final week of the first half term, Year 4 have battled on and once again been absolutely awesome.

On Monday, 3 fabulous metaphor examples from last Friday's English lesson were shared with the class. Well done to Joey, Arthur and Ben for using such fantastic vocabulary. We spent 2 days this week consolidating the use of conjunctions, prepositions and adverbs, and using apostrophes for contractions. We then investigated powerful verbs to describe the movement of animals and then planned and wrote our own animal poems.



This week in PSHE, we have been concentrating on friendships, and overcoming problems within friendships. The class were split into two groups for this. Mrs Calvy took the boys outside to investigate teamwork skills. The boys used various apparatus to make up games in groups, and then teach their game to the other groups. Girls On Board is an initiative that dissects girls' friendships and helps to understand and overcome common problems that occur. These sessions will be revisited after half term.

The moon is his colossal, crescent tail, flapping around.





It has been an excellent half term in Year 5. Everyone has worked so incredibly hard and shown real progress from the start of


September.

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












The Zones of Regulation



The Zones of Regulation is a complete social-emotional learning curriculum that we use in school, created to teach children self-regulation and emotional control. This overview covers a brief explanation of what the Zones of Regulation are, how they're taught to children and how you can begin using the concepts in your own home.

What Do the Zones Teach Children?

Here are some skills taught during The Zones of Regulation:

- Identifying your emotions by categorising feelings into four zones (more on this below)
- **Self-regulation:** Achieving the preferred state of alertness (zone) for a situation.
- **Identifying triggers**: Learning what makes you "tick" and why
- Coping strategies: Various techniques and strategies that help achieve emotional regulation.
- **Size of the problem:** Introduces that the size of your reaction should match the size of your problem.
- **Expected behaviour vs unexpected behaviour:** This also covers perspective taking and how *your* behaviour affects the thoughts and feelings of the people around you

What Are the Zones Colours & Their Meanings?

The Zones of Regulation uses four colours to help children self-identify how they're feeling and categorise it based on colour.

The Green Zone: The green zone is used to describe when you're in a calm state of alertness. Being in the green zone means you are calm, focused, happy or ready to learn. This is predominantly the state you *want* your child to be in. It's also the state most needed in the classroom in order to learn.

The Yellow Zone: The yellow zone describes when you have a heightened sense of alertness. This isn't always a bad thing, and you still have some control of your actions when you're in the yellow zone. Being in the yellow means you may feel frustrated, anxious or nervous. But, it could also mean you're feeling excited, silly, or hyper – which is okay in the right situations.

The Red Zone: The red zone describes an extremely heightened state of intense emotions. When a person reaches the red zone, they're no longer able to control their emotions or reactions. This is the zone kids are in during meltdowns. Being in the red zone means you're feeling anger, rage, terror or complete devastation and feel out of control.

The Blue Zone: The blue zone, on the other hand, is used when a person is feeling *low states of alertness or arousal.* When you're in the blue zone you may be feeling down – sad, sick, tired, or bored. You're still in control, as you are in the yellow zone, but with low energy emotions.

The first step in teaching the Zones to your child is teaching your child the four zones and which emotions fall into each zone. You'll achieve this through practicing with your child, talking about The Zones frequently and in different environments, and encouraging them to identify which zone they're in. 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Maths at Hinguar



The National Curriculum emphasises the importance of all pupils mastering the content taught each year and discourages the acceleration of pupils into content from subsequent years. The current National Curriculum document1 says: 'The expectation is that the majority of pupils will move through the programmes of study at broadly the same pace. However, decisions about when to progress should always be based on the security of pupils' understanding and their readiness to progress to the next stage. Pupils who grasp concepts rapidly should be challenged through being offered rich and sophisticated problems before any acceleration through new content. Those who are not sufficiently fluent with earlier material should consolidate their understanding, including through additional practice, before moving on.' (National curriculum page 3)

For example, in Year 3 they are currently working on addition and subtraction. The majority of the class will be working on mastery questions with some children accessing the mastery with greater depth questions to deepen their knowledge and understanding, as below. See if you can solve these questions at home.

Mastery	Mastery with Greater Depth
Write the four number facts that this bar model shows. 540	Flo and Jim are answering a problem: Danny has read 62 pages of the class book, Jack has read 43. How many more pages has Danny read than Jack? Flo does the calculation 62 + 43. Jim does the calculation 62–43. Who is correct? Explain how you know. Pupils might demonstrate using a bar model to explain their reasoning.
Using coins, find three ways to make £1.	Sophie has five coins in her pocket. How much money might she have? What is the greatest amount she can have? What is the least amount she can have? If all the coins are different: What is the greatest amount she can have? What is the least amount she can have?



















CityFibre — Gigabit-speed Broadband

We do not usually inform anyone else if you contact the school nurse. We might inform someone if we were concerned about you or your child's safety, but we would usually speak to you first. Your messages are stored and can be seen by other healthcare staff who follow the same confidentiality rules. We aim to reply to you within one working day and you should get an immediate bounce-back to confirm we received your text. Texts will not be seen outside of normal working hours. If you need help before you hear back from us, contact a member of school staff or your doctor. Our text number does not receive voice calls or MMS picture messages. We support messaging from UK mobile numbers only (which does not include messages sent from landlines, international mobile numbers and some "number masking" mobile apps). Prevent the school nurse from sending messages to you by texting STOP to our number. Messages are charged at your usual rate.
