

Starfish Class

This week, Starfish class have been learning about Diwali, the festival of light.

Our story focus has been 'Dipal's Diwali' which has helped us to discover how Diwali is celebrated. The children enjoyed talking about the events in the story and discussed some similarities between other festivals and celebrations they have experienced. Some comments included, "I wore a princess dress to my birthday party", "My Christmas tree is in the loft. When it's Christmas we put lights on it", "They decorated their house and they had sweets. I like sweets" and "I saw some fireworks at the beach. They went bang, they were red and green."







The children have been developing their fine and gross motor skills through mark making and manipulating the playdough. In the garden we have explored using chalk to create rangoli patterns and we have decorated hand shapes to make

a mehndi design. We explored making some Diva lamps using the playdough and used various materials to decorate them.

For our cooking activity we have been busy making vegetable samosas. The children have been developing their chopping and cutting skills whilst preparing the vegetables. We talked about and identified the different shapes of the pastry. We discovered that to begin with the pastry was a rectangle, but after folding it to make the samosa it had changed to a triangle.







Seahorse Class



This week, Seahorse Class have been exploring pumpkins, Bonfire Night and Diwali. We began the week by looking at the lifecycle of a pumpkin and discovered that from a seed it becomes a yellow flower before growing into a pumpkin. The children used their senses to look, touch and smell some pumpkins; they enjoyed cutting and scooping out the insides to discover the pumpkins' flesh and seeds. Some children took a few seeds home to try and grow their own pumpkin. Throughout the week the children have engaged in exercises to strengthen their gross and fine motor skills and develop increased control over their bodies. They have sung action songs such as Roly, Poly, Tommy Thumb, Granny's Glasses and One Finger, One Thumb. As a class we discussed fireworks and researched the origin story of Bonfire Night. On the craft table the children made sparklers from metallic paper and straws. We listened to the story 'Sparks in the Sky' and discussed how to keep safe when attending a fireworks party. Later in the week, we researched Diwali, the festival of light and created 'Happy Diwali' cards. We watched a CBeebies clip to discover how families celebrate Diwali. The children were enthralled by the story of Rama and Sita, which inspired us to begin our salt dough Diya lamp project. In Maths the children have been making playing cards to show their understanding of how a number can be represented in a pattern.











Oyster Class



We used oil pastels to create our own firework art.






In English, we have been looking at the use of descriptive language. We discovered that the story of the Gruffalo is very descriptive!



In Maths lessons this week, we have been thinking about taking away. We created our own take away stories.




Well done, Oysters for settling back into our learning so quickly after half term.








Seagull Class

Og (a Stone Age man from the Neolithic era) came into school and told us all about how hard life was thousands of years ago. Everyone got the chance to hold some real flint arrow-heads and spear tips and stones that had been used as cutting implements and we were almost fooled by the Fool's Gold! We also played some great games which taught us all about the dangers of life in the Stone Age and what food was and wasn't available. Everyone had a go at throwing a spear at a woolly mammoth and we talked about what a magnificent archaeological find Otzi the Iceman and Cheddar Man were for historians and the amazing facts they have taught us.

The costumes were utterly brilliant, so a big thank you to everyone at home who went out of their way to make the children look so amazing. We are now all very excited to learn about the Bronze Age and the Irone Age! History rocks!!













Sanderling Class






An excellent first week back for Year 5.

The ISP's can now all be viewed online, so the class teacher will share with you a code so only you can access the confidential document. Please share your comments online, so we know that you have read and agree with the outcomes (targets).

Your comments are extremely helpful and inform our partnership working when supporting your child with their difficulties.
