


On Friday, we used everything experienced this week to make notes, ready to write our own book week newspaper article next week.

Starfish Class

Another busy week for Nursery! We started the week learning about Pancake Day and reading the story Mr Wolf's Pancakes. We pretended to make our own pancakes and sang a pancake rhyme before trying the pancakes for ourselves. We thought they were yummy and wanted more! The children then worked on their cutting skills by cutting out pictures of fruit to stick on a pancake to make a face. We also watched some of the Ceremony where Prince Charlies declared Southend as a City.

Our other story this week was Supertato. We read the story and the children pretended to plant potatoes in the



soil. They talked about what potatoes need to grow. We also make a face on Mr Potato's head and talked about the different features that we have. The children also turned potatoes into Supertato, by




SEND PARENT FORUM MEETING Thursday 3rd March

Thank you to those parent who attended the Hinguar's SEND Parent Forum – supporting your child with exams and tests. Here are some top tips to help your child with their weekly spelling tests (3littlebuttons.com)

- 5 minutes every day is better than a last-minute dash of 20 minutes the night before. Practise in different ways: orally in the car, in soap in the bath, plastic letters and with paper. This makes it fun with small children!
- Spellings are related to sounds at this age (phonics) so make this connection with your child. E.g if the sound is ai/ay show them! (They should know....). How many of the words have ai in them and how many have ay? Where is the ay in the word? Where is the ai? (Ay is often at the end, ai is often in the middle).

-Some children need tricks to help them remember such as rhyme or mnemonics. For example, the tricky word 'could' c.... then the rhyme, 'oh, u, lucky, duck!"

• Finally, don't worry about your child. Your child does need to practise at home, but they also need to know that it's ok to not get them all right! The transference of the spelling skill to their own work is more important than a one-off test.

Above are the comments our pupils were asked for top tips for parents around completing work at home and getting them 'test' ready. They were similar to the NHS recommendations.

Help your child beat exam stress (nhs.uk)

Watch for signs of stress- Tests and exams can be a challenging part of school life for children and young people and their parents or carers. But there are ways to ease the stress. Children and young people who are stressed may: worry a lot, feel tense, have headaches and stomach pains, not sleep well, are irritable, lose interest in food or eat more than normal, not enjoy activities they previously enjoyed, are negative and have a low mood, feel hopeless about the future. Having someone to talk to about their work can help. Support from a parent can help young people share their worries and keep things in perspective. Encourage your child to talk to a member of school staff who they feel is supportive. Try to involve your child as much as possible.

Make sure your child eats well - a balanced diet is vital for your child's health and can help them feel well during school. Where possible, involve your child in shopping for food and encourage them to choose some healthy snacks.

Help your child get enough sleep - good sleep improves thinking and concentration. Allow half an hour or so for your child to wind down between screen time and going to bed, to help them get a good night's sleep.

Be flexible during exams - staying calm yourself can help. Remember, stressful times do not last forever.

Help them study - help them come up with practical ideas that will help them revise, in a fun way.

Talk about exam nerves - remind your child that it's normal to feel anxious. Nervousness is a natural reaction to exams. The key is to put these nerves to positive use. Help your child face their fears and see these activities through, rather than avoiding them.

Encourage exercise during exams - exercise can help boost energy levels, clear the mind and relieve stress. It does not matter what it is – walking, cycling, swimming, football and dancing are all effective.

Do not add to the pressure - support group Childline says many children who contact them feel that most pressure at exam time comes from their family. Listen to your child, give them support and avoid criticism

Make time for treats - rewards do not need to be big or expensive. They can include simple things like making their favourite meal or watching TV.







Seahorse Class

This week in Seahorse Class, we have continued to learn through the stories of Percy the Park Keeper. We have listened to Percy and his friends going on a treasure hunt as well as sleeping through a storm! Some children tired 'Hot Seating' where they became a character from the story and answered questions whilst keeping in character.

During our phonics sessions, we have been working on re-capping the sounds we have learnt over the past few weeks as well as introducing a new sound 'oa'. All the children have worked very hard with the formation of the letters and this is something we will continue with next week.

Everyone tried a delicious pancake on Tuesday and we made a tally chart of our favourite toppings! There were some very interesting choices!

During our maths sessions we have been working on one more and one less up to 10.

Well done to everyone for making such a big effort to celebrate World Book Day. We really enjoyed seeing the children dressed up and loved listening to them sharing their favourite stories. Thank you for your support.



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Seagull Class



Finally we had a challenge to measure twisty beanstalks. We had to work out which equipment was best to use as our rulers could not twist like the beanstalks.



We were very excited to dress up for World Book Day. We talked about our favourite characters and our favourite books. We also tried our best to work our who the masked






















100% Attendance and Punctuality Prize

This week, we have continued with our biography unit about Mary Jackson or Tim Peake. After using excellent research skills, the children have written a biography using parenthesis, relative clauses, and cohesive devices. It was amazing to see all the children dressed up as characters from their favourite books and they even wrote a 100-word biography about their chosen character. After discussing the reason behind World Book Day, the children created book tokens to encourage a peer to read. In maths, we have bring adding 3 or more fractions. After excellent verbal reasoning answers, many children have written very good answers. In Art, we have been learning about Leonardo Da Vinci's Flying Machines. After studying Leonardo Da Vinci, the children created flying machines with paper, sticks and elastic bands. Lastly, in history we have been watching clips from Hidden Figures. Hidden Figures is the story of a team of female African American mathematicians who served a vital role in NASA during the early years of the U.S. space program. They have amazed me with their very mature attitude and detailed discussions in groups and with peers.













Heron Class

In Heron Class this week, the children finished their work on Statistics in Maths and are now ready to start the unit on Measurement next week. In English and Computing, they have been researching what we need to do to stay healthy and have worked really hard on planning, drafting and creating promotional posters for a healthy life.
