"Southend SEND: What happens next" 2022

The Advisory SEN Support Team, from Southend City Council, want to hear your views... whether you are a parent, carer, representative from a family forum organisation or support charity, pupil, SENCo, Senior Leader or Governor.

Southend City Council had an independent peer review about special educational needs (November 2021). More information about this can be found on Southend's Local Offer portal. The peer review followed on from a revisit by OFSTED and the Care Quality Commission and the later report published in June 2021, which found there had been sufficient progress made in three out of four areas of significant weakness found in an October 2018 inspection. The fourth area was joint commissioning. A recommendation from the peer review is "there is a clear system wide understanding of the graduated response across Southend". "Parents and carers need 'what happens next' explained in a clear and understandable way, to make the 'maze' of SEND services easier to navigate".

The purpose of this informal event is to share information and gather your views about:

- How can we share information better?
- What does happen next?
- What can we do to support families more?
- · What are your experiences about how we do things in Southend?
- How can we bring about more consistency between settings?

linked beautifully with our Maths focus this week where we have been exploring capacity. We decided that the staff at the water treatment works would definitely need to understand capacity for their work.

them a lovely opportunity to see how important our learning in class is.











Maths

White Rose Maths have created a FREE App for children to help with early number skills. This may help KS1 children and some KS2 children who struggle with basic Maths skills. This works alongside class teaching.

1-Minute Maths App | White Rose Maths



What's the app about?

This first version of the app is aimed at Key Stage 1 pupils (ie, age 5-6 years). Individual one-minute tasks focus on adding and subtracting — and on 'Subitising', the skill of instantly recognising the number of items in a group without counting. Multiplication and division topics are also now available!

How do we use it?

Your child can choose any topic they want to try. They then answer a unique series of questions (so it's a different set of questions every time). If they're struggling with a question, a 'Hint' button will give a helpful clue by showing the question in a different but familiar way.

When the one minute's up, they'll see a feedback screen telling them how they've done.


Seagull Class

Information for Parents

Reminder - Please ensure your child's hair is tied up for school

There are some children coming into school without their hair tied up, this is part of our school uniform policy.

There is research to show that there are several good reasons to tie their up or at least off their face.

Eyes/Vision - Between the ages of a year to seven, is crucial for children's eye development. There is a school of thought, that if the hair is blocking one eye or falling partially over both eyes, that it can block out both daylight and sensory stimulation. A lack of either, can inhibit the development of the eyes. It's important to find ways to clip or tie hair away from the face for this reason.

Chewing - Hair chewing habits can be prevented if the hair is tied away from the face.

Head-Lice - There are many ways in which to tackle those little critters. One of the best ways, is prevention. Having the hair tied back, particularly in a bun or plait is one of the most effective ways of keeping the headlice at bay. With the hair tied back, it makes it more difficult for the lice to grab hold of the hair.



It was very exciting to learn about her job as an inventor and of all the companies she has worked for over the years. A huge thank you from Avocet class.



This week in KS1, Alice the Bunny was awarded to Seagull Class with 96 % and in KS2 the attendance cup was awarded to Curlew Class with 100 %


The classes will be rewarded with an extra turn on the play equipment.

This week, in English, Year 5 have continued with narrative writing- myths and legends. Our key focus has been dialogue between characters and writing in paragraphs using the story 'Can you catch a mermaid?'. The children have worked extremely hard this week to ensure they are including the success criteria into their writing. We ended the week on a dilemmashould Eliza give the mirror back to Freya, but this



would mean her friend would turn into a mermaid or keep the mirror and have a friend for life. We displayed this using 'Decision Alley'. One child was Eliza and she walked through a tunnel of children. One side encouraged Eliza to keep the mirror and the other side used guilt to persuade Eliza to hand the mirror back.


The children were excellent in this activity and produced excellent writing as a result. Next week, the children will be writing their own narratives based on 'Can you catch a mermaid?'

In Maths, we are coming to the end of our fractions topic. All the children have been multiplying unit, non-unit fractions and mixed numbers by an integer and finding fractions of an amount.

In History, we have had in depth conversations about segregation using the story Hidden Figures. The children have since produced an excellent write up about segregation and their feelings behind the topic. We have also learnt about Amelia Earhart, the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean in 1932.
