


#### SANDERLING CLASS

and retold the story of Boudicca. They also had chariot racing competitions and yet more gladiator battles.




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# Seahorse Class






This week, Seahorse Class flew to Nigeria and Tanzania. We began the week by role -playing how we would travel if we went to Nigeria and Tanzania by aeroplane. We then used Google Earth to locate both countries and discovered that they were in Africa.



In Literacy, we have read the Handa's collection of books. After reading these, the children discussed the similarities and differences between how Handa lives and how we live. The children could see that animals such as elephants do not roam our streets, we do not carry our shopping in a basket on our head and

as a child they would not walk to another town by themselves. The children used their phonic skills to write labels or a sentence about their fa-

vourite part in Handa's Surprise. They also went on a fruit word hunt, writing the corresponding words to pictures.



The children were fascinated by the African animals and played a game of guess the animal, where one was slowly revealed as they decided which animal it was. On the mark making table the children used different animal patterns to decorate a range of African animals.

We discovered that bright coloured patterns are important in African cultures as they are a means of expression and communication. The children have designed their own

patterns, printing with potatoes and paint. A classmate bought in her traditional Nigerian dress and spoke

about how her whole family wear patterned clothes to parties and gatherings with relatives and friends.

In Maths, the children have been looking at teen numbers and identifying why a teen number is a teen number. The children have used Numicon and tens frames to create teen numbers, before putting them in the correct order.














# **Avocet Class**





This week in Seagull class, we looked at persuasive texts and created posters encouraging people to buy toys. We watched adverts for inspiration and thought about persuasive language.











#### <u>Special Educational Needs Update – DYSLEXIA</u>

Myth – Reading and Writing letters backwards or in the wrong order are the main characteristic of Dyslexia

Fact – All young children do this until about the age of 6. Some Dyslexic children continue to do this, and some do not.

Myth – Dyslexia is caused by not reading enough at home.

Fact – It is a neurological condition, and although reading more at home will help all children to develop their reading skills, it does not affect whether a child is Dyslexic or not.

# What can we do in school to support with children who are showing signs of Dyslexia?

All children if they need additional support in class will have provision and arrangements put into place to support them, especially with their English skills, without a Dyslexia diagnosis. This may include phonic interventions, Toe by Toe programme, coloured overlays, bookmarks to support reading across the page and Precision Teaching. In all classrooms we ensure that all English work is broken down into smaller chunks, we provide multi-sensory learning and ensure the font size and background screens colours are considered. For older children, we provide spell checkers and assessment arrangements, such as additional time in tests which can be in put into place without a formal diagnosis. At senior school or university level, a formal assessment may take place, for additional arrangements for exams.

The SENCO or Educational Psychologists will not diagnose any child with Dyslexia in Primary school.

## What can families do at home to support children who are showing signs of <u>Dyslexia?</u>

Continue to regularly read with your child and read to them, so they still have the passion of reading a 'good' book.

Be patient; set a timer when completing English work, so there is a clear finish time for the child.

Play card games, word games (scrabble) and matching pairs to help develop the 'working memory'.

Don't ever give up. Teach your child to persevere, even when they face challenges.

Speak to the Class Teacher or school SENCO to gain more support for your child and family.

Do not feel you should pay out for a private assessment, as your child will still get the additional support in school he/she needs without a private diagnosis.

# Parents Information



#### **Important Information for Parents**

As from next week ( w/c 9th May 2022 ) all school lunches must be booked and paid for via Parentmail in advance (bookings cannot be made on the day). If your child is in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 or in receipt of free school meals, you will still need to book a school lunch for them but you will not be charged.

Teachers will no longer be taking a dinner register in class in the mornings and meals will be prepared according to what has been booked. This includes vegetarian options and jacket potatoes. Only children in Years 3—6 can select a jacket potato option. If you have selected jacket potato and your child is not in those years they will be given a main meal.

Thank you for your co-operation.



#### **Attendance**

By law, all children of compulsory school age must receive a full-time education that meets their needs and parents are responsible for making sure they attend school, or they are educated at home.

A child who misses school for at least 10% of the time is considered a persistently absent child and prolonged or frequent absenteeism is treated seriously. Parents are considered to be breaking the law when their child regularly misses school and can therefore be fined.

Local authorities and schools have sufficient legal powers to prosecute parents.

If a child is regularly absent, they may fall behind with learning. This makes attendance fundamental in ensuring young people become successful learners.

When children attend school consistently, they are more likely to do well in their work but also build strong relationships and feel connected with the school community. Good attendance also demonstrates reliability which will help prepare children for life beyond education.

Please support your children by ensuring they come to school every day.





# Safeguarding

#### **Huggy Wuggy videos**

#### POLICE ISSUE WARNING TO PARENTS

Police are urging parents to stop their children from watching videos on social media platforms including TikTok that feature a killer bear called Huggy Wuggy - a main character in 'Poppy Playtime'.

These are videos and songs that people have made, which are popping up all over YouTube and Tik Tok in particular, using graphic imagery of a bear-like character with razor sharp teeth. It's based around jump scares and things children should not be exposed to.

The warning comes amid concerns that some children are copying the bear's actions in the playground and that the videos are graphic and traumatising to young children. The TikTok videos - which began as a puzzle game that sees Huggy stalking players in a toy factory - include Huggy Wuggy singing about "hugging and killing" and also asks those watching to "take their last breath".

They look fairly harmless initially but it becomes pretty apparent as to the sinister nature of these videos. It is concerning as a lot of parents will be oblivious as to the levels of violence their children are being exposed to watching them.

Please continue to closely monitor your child's use of the internet and talk with your child about how to keep themselves safe online.
