

School dinner menus will be published weekly for the following week to be ordered and paid for on the Parent Mail app. Universal and Free School Meal children will still need to order their choices on the Parent Mail app **but will not be charged.** 

To order, open the IRIS Parent Mail app and go to accounts. In accounts there is the School Dinner Register, tap on this to open the School Dinner Register and tap one of the days. This will take you to the screen with the menus for the week where you can order your choices for the individual day or full week.







# Seahorse Class



This week, Seahorse Class have travelled back to Europe to explore Spain and France. We discussed what knowledge we had regarding these 2 countries, before learning about the culture. We discovered that both countries had a coast on the Mediterranean Sea. The children then went on an underwater adventure via Now Press Play. This led to our Literacy activity, where the children had an underwater scene as a stimulus to write sentences.

On the Mark-making table, the children have made Spanish fans, written postcards, and began to create a passport with all the flags of the countries we have travelled to so far.




In Music, the children have sung tradition French and Spanish songs. They have also enjoyed the singing assemblies when they sing 'When I grow up', 'Sing from the heart' and 'Bring it all back'.

In Maths, the children have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. We began by naming 2D shapes and their properties, before using them within our drawings. We then played guess the shape, where the 2D shapes were placed in a feely bag and clues were given for the children to decipher. They have also looked for shapes within the classroom environment.

We listened to the story Grandpa's Quilt by Betsy Franco, where a quilt was made using different 2D shapes. The children then positioned and drew around 2D shapes to create their own quilt designs on paper. This required them to critically think about the shape and its orientation. Later, the children discovered 3D shapes and their properties. The children then used 3D shapes to build, exploring which shapes would balance and which would not and why.

Outside, the children have enjoyed the warmer weather, with some creating a pond in the sandpit. This involved great teamwork, where a hole was dug, before water was poured and toy fish were added.

Please could all children bring a hat to school every day and have sun cream applied before arriving at school. Thank you.









### SEND



### The four categories of SEND

Schools follow the guidelines from the government's SEND Code of Practice, where SEND is broken up into four categories: Some children have more than one type of SEND. Here explains the main areas of need in each category.

### Communication and Interaction (C&I), including:

- Autism / ASD
- Social communication difficulties (other than autism)

Speech & language difficulties (e.g., receptive language difficulties, selective mutism, tongue tie).

### Cognition and Learning (C&L), including:

- Specific Learning difficulties.
- Dyslexia & dyscalculia.

Focus, attention, or memory difficulties.

### Social, Emotional Mental Health (SEMH), including:

- Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder.
- Attention Defiance Disorder.
- Anxiety.
- Depression.

Dysregulated behaviour.

### Physical / Sensory needs, including:

- Physical needs (e.g., cerebral palsy, developmental co-ordination disorder);
- Deafness or hearing difficulty.
- Blind or visually impaired.









SEND



If parents have concerns relating to their child's learning, then please initially discuss these with your child's teacher. This then may result in a referral to the school SENDCo, Mrs. Kerri White. All parents will be listened to. Their views and their aspirations for their child will be central to the assessment and provision that is provided by the school. Parents can look at the following websites:

Southend's Local Offer can be found under the 'umbrella' of <u>Livewell Southend</u>, this can be found <u>Local Offer - (SEND) – Southend-on-Sea City Council</u>. The Local Offer is a website that is written for parents and families. It is a guide to all schools and services in our area, such as: schools, leisure activities, support services, health services.

Their intention is to provide information to enable you to make your own informed choices. They provide a free, impartial and confidential service to parents and carers of children who have special educational needs and or a disability. 










## **Avoet Class**


Auditions have been completed this week and parts allocated for all children for our production. Scripts have been sent home for all the actors. Please support your


children with learning their parts. Rehearsals will begin next week.


### Reading Champions

# Seagull Class



# Starfish Class


