Curlew Class

This week has been just too(th) exciting!

On Monday, we were fortunate enough to welcome a fabulous tooth expert in the form of the lovely Mrs Paterson, who is a dental hygienist. She delivered a fantastic workshop, which included informative and scientific PowerPoint presentations, hand drawn diagrams, group sorting activities, scientific photos and finally a quiz to summarise everything that had been covered.



Thank you so much Mrs Paterson for giving us your time and sharing your extensive knowledge. It is very much appreciated.

After a week's observations, we collected the final results of our tooth decay experiment. All the eggshells looked very different to each other, and most had changed considerably from only one week ago. The orange and apple juice caused the most corrosion - also the orange juice stank and the apple juice had gone mouldy (yuk!). We were surprised to discover that although the coke caused the most discolouration, it unexpectedly had not actually caused any corrosion. As expected, (due to our earlier workshop with Mrs Paterson), the water and milk caused little to no change to the eggshell. The children then wrote their own conclusions to summarise what they had learned by completing this investigation.



This week, the class have been busy rewriting a short science fiction story called 'Alien Landing'. Last week we identified the underlying pattern in the original story and then voted to determine the character names, setting and a specific alien memento for the characters to be given in our new and improved versions. We then individually chose our own appearances and personalities for our characters (Amy and Georgia), and brainstormed descriptive vocabulary to describe the setting. The children then planned the rest of the story before putting all their ideas together to write their final drafts.



Well done, Year 4 for another fantastic week. I can't believe I only have one last half term with these gorgeous young people.

This week, Seahorse Class travelled back to the United Kingdom to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. We began the week, by discussing the life of Queen Elizabeth II and the legacy she will leave behind her. We discovered that she sent her first email in 1976 and can drive without holding a driving licence. As a class we used photographs to create a timeline of the Queen's life.

We have listened to the story, *The Queen's Hat* by Steve Antony and had fun trying to find the corgi and butler on each page. This led to the children designing their own royal hats. The children have written lists of items for a tea party, created flags and drawn pictures of the Queen on the mark-making table.

The children have used their knowledge of 2D shapes to create crowns. They have used their fine motor skills to move and position gems to design patterns on crown templates. On the playdough table, the children have made cakes for the jubilee. As a class we have listened to the National anthem and sang the Diamond Jubilee song 'Sing' by Gary Barlow.

A miniature royal family and London came to visit the classroom on Wednesday, with children narrating their small world play as they moved the characters.

If families are interested, could they please email us at: museum@essex-fire.gov.uk and tell us the number in their party and the time they would like to arrive.



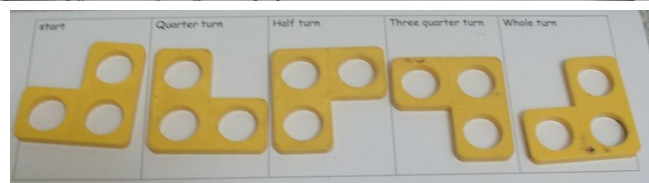

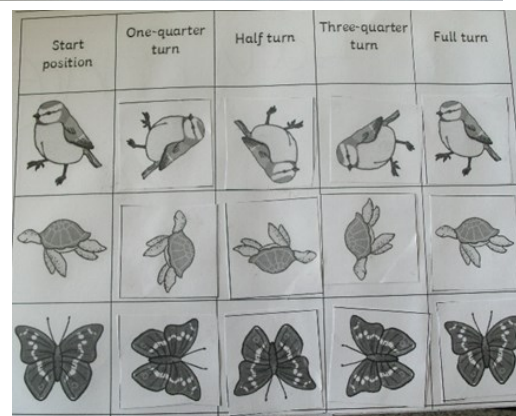

Aim: I can order dates from earliest to latest on a timeline.

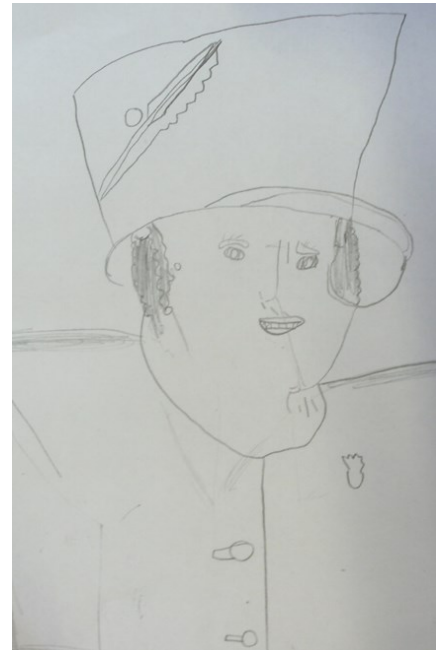

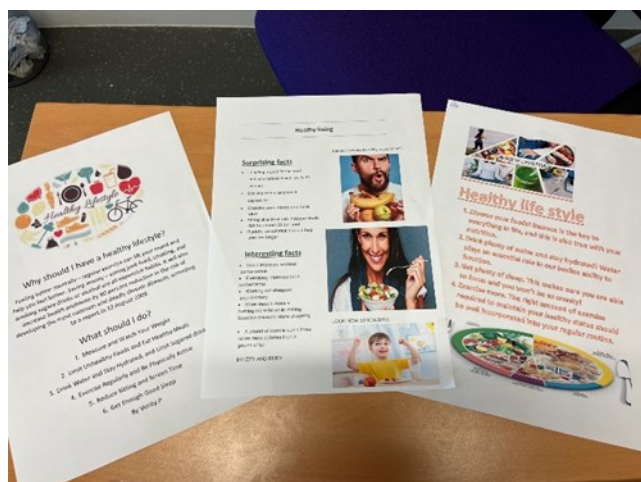
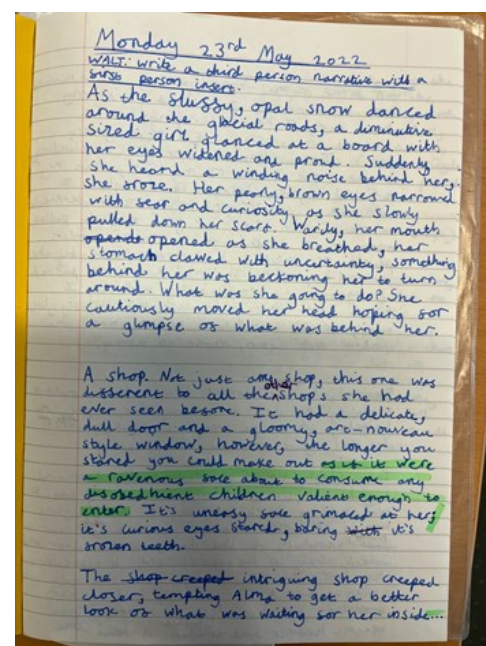


Avocet Class

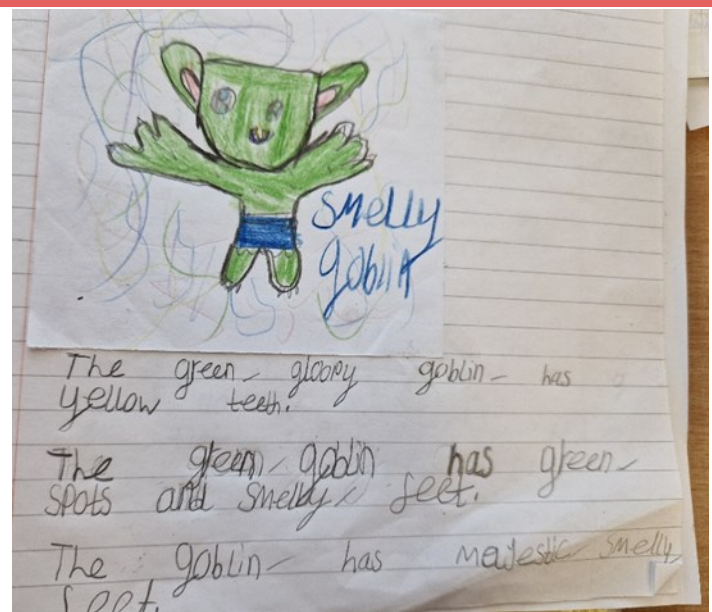
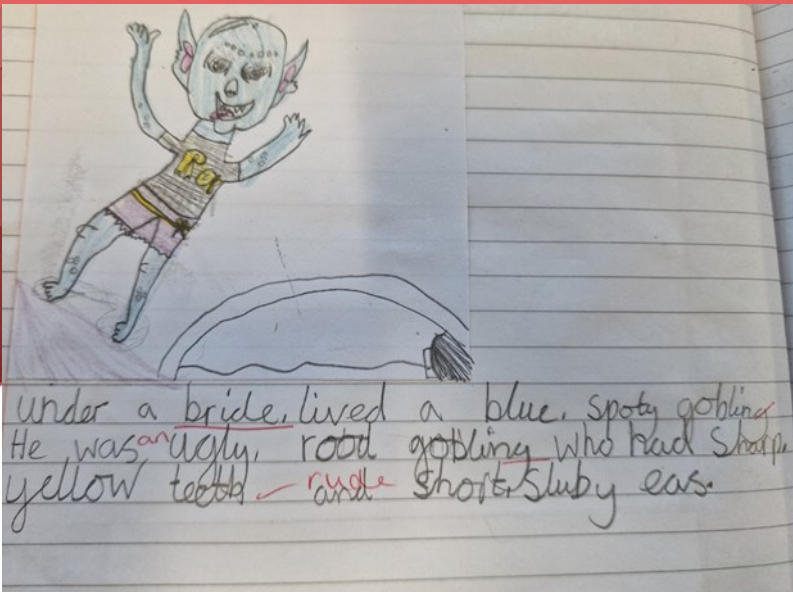

The classes will be rewarded with an extra turn on the play equipment.

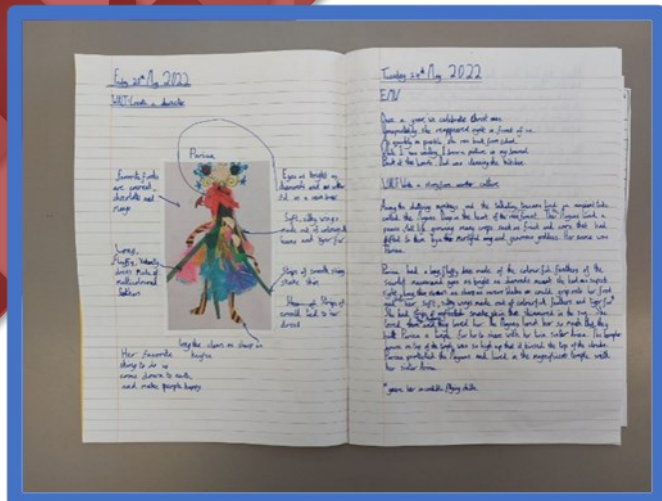
