

Neurodiverse Workshop








This week, we have been exploring the concept of rhyming words and measuring through the book 'Stickman' by Julia Donaldson. We began the week by listening to the story and

trying to hear and identify rhyming words. We discussed how it was the end sounds of a word that need to sound the same to make them rhyme. To highlight the pattern of how words rhyme, as a class we wrote a list of words which rhymed with cat and dog.

In Literacy, the children were asked to choose a picture and then write a list of

rhyming words. Some of the children then put these words into a sentence. The children also went on a word hunt and discovered that all the words found rhymed with each other. In the builders tray, the children made patterns, wrote letters, their names and tricky words in glittery flour.

In Art, to consolidate our recent


theme of seasons the children used paint to combine circular rings of colour to create a tree inspired by



skills of perspective drawing to create our own version.



This week in Starfish class, our story focus has been 'Bear Snores On'. We have expanded our vocabulary, learning the word hibernate, and have investigated which animals hibernate over the winter months.

In our tuff tray we have explored ice and looked closely at the changes that occurred as the ice melted. We then further explored animal habitats with a wintery small world scene, using shaving foam and cotton wool for snow.

We have used our gross physical skills to create our own animal dens in the garden and role-played being animals hibernating inside to keep warm. We discussed what we do to keep ourselves warm in winter and the children created some fantastic winter clothes pictures.

The children had great fun making their own 'snow and ice' playdough, using white dough and adding sparkles.


Our wintery theme led to lots of discussion about Frozen and Elsa and Anna. Everyone had great fun joining in with singing to Let it go!

Oyster Class




In Year 1 this week, we have been having lots of

fun creating new characters for a story. At the end of last week, we created an alien for our story and this week we have decided on a new main character called Bob.


The children created their character, planned and wrote their stories. As you can see, the children have enjoyed creating their new characters and it really shows in the quality of their writing.








Curlew Class



This week, the children have been making the most of our outdoor space. In English lessons, we have been exploring our senses and using this to help us with our writing. The children went on a sensory walk around the school grounds and then discussed what they had seen, smelt, heard and felt. They used this to write sensory descriptive sentences about an Autumn setting. They went on to write descriptions of a variety of other settings by imagining they were really there and thinking about their senses. Some great descriptive writing was created as a result.



We also went outside for our RE lessons. We have been learning about the Jewish festival of Sukkot and how, thousands of years ago, the Jewish people travelled the desert looking for somewhere to live. Along the way they built tents from palm leaves and branches called Sukkah. Sukkah is a Hebrew word meaning tent. We decided to make our own mini versions in our outdoor learning area.

Our art lesson this week was also inspired by the great outdoors. We have been learning about warm and cool colours. We completed a sunrise collage using warm colours for the sun's rays and cool colours for the water.






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
Heron Class




