

Starfish Class



This week in Starfish class, our story focus has been The Three Little Pigs. We thought carefully about the type of house we would like to build. The children had some fantastic 'grand designs', using their mark making skills to express their ideas and communication and language skills to give meanings to marks they made.

The children have been very eager to join in with the repeated phrases and have made story maps to sequence events and help them retell the story in their own words. They have loved interacting together to play What's the Time, Mr Wolf?, showing turn taking, listening and physical skills to escape the wolf! We have enjoyed acting out the story in the garden and were very

lucky to have a delivery of our very own house made of sticks.

This term, we are focusing on the artist Christopher Kuster. Christopher uses his mouth to draw and paint his pictures. We wondered if we could produce art by using our mouths too. Just like the wolf we tried huffing and puffing through a straw to make paint filled bubbles which we then printed onto paper. The children had great fun with this art activity and produced lots of different coloured bubbles!

The cold weather this week has caused lots of ice to appear in the nursery garden. This has resulted in lots of discussion about how ice is formed and what happens when it melts. We decided to experiment with making ice charms. The children placed gems into small pots of water and found a safe place in the garden to see if they will freeze into hanging ice charms overnight. We are very excited to see the results!

Next week our story focus will be The Great Race – a traditional story about Chinese New Year.

Musical madness has continued this week with the children investigating pitch. They had the opportunity to play a variety of instruments in order to discover how high and low notes could be produced on each one. Some children were also set an extra challenge to make their own pan pipes from different length straws.

Last week, we began reading our class text 'The Iron Man'. After writing a description of the main character, this week we discovered what happened to him after standing on the brink of the cliff in the strong wind. The children then imagined watching him falling over the edge and breaking up, and thought about what they would see, hear and feel when witnessing this.

Seahorse Class



This week, Seahorse Class have explored 'The 3 Billy Goats Gruff'. After reading the story, the children re-enacted it with Duplo and small world figures. As they did this, they used familiar phrases from within the story.

For Literacy, the children drew their own troll, before labelling their character with

describing words. We have also read 'The Troll' by Julia Donaldson and recognised that a troll can have different characteristics and adventures in alternative stories.



The children have been fascinated by the frosty conditions, which connected well with our Now Press Play journey into a Wintery story. Within this experience, the children

listened to instructions to explore a Winter's Day. They made a snowman, broke the ice in the bird bath, before having a hot chocolate

to warm up!



In Maths, the children have been exploring addition and number recognition. The children had Duplo blocks marked with numerals 1-10. They then played against



a friend rolling a dice to count on and connect the correct number of blocks. In addition, they needed to make sure they were connecting the blocks with the correct numeral to ensure their tower read 1 -10.

Throughout the week, the children have made stick puppets, built bridges with Duplo, played with the cars and garage, and role-played in the kitchen.



On Friday, we celebrated Chinese and Lunar New Year. The children used paint to create fans, watched Abbie attend a Chinese and Lunar New Year parade via a CBeebies video and listened to the story 'Dragons in the City'.

In Maths lessons this week, we have continued learning about money, recognising coins and notes, making totals and calculating change. We completed a series on money challenges using the computers.










In our English lessons this week, we have been looking at bird themed poetry. We created free form poems and Haikus. The children really enjoyed using language in different ways.




















Avocet Class




Sanderling Class

This week in maths, we have recapped long multiplication and started short division. On Wednesday, we had an active maths lesson with challenge questions around the hall. The children had to answer a question and race around the hall to find the answer. They all worked very well in their partnership and it was a great way to assess their understanding.



In Science, we have described the movement of the sun, moon and Earth. Additionally, we have learnt about the Earth's rotation and how it forms day and night.


Oyster Class


Heron Class





A Good Nights Sleep?

A GOOD NIGHTS SLEEP?

Many of us are finding that sleep is difficult . Below are some tips to support getting children to sleep.

- Be calm and consistent, children need routine
- Praise whenever they are doing the right thing eg 'I like the way you have......' 'thank you for........' 'well done for..........' Children need to hear the things they are getting right clearly explained.
- Turn off technology an hour before bedtime and keep lighting low, this helps to release sleep hormones.
- Do not have the bedroom too warm, body temperature needs to drop to aide sleep.
- Try not to have discussions once the bedtime routine has started. Store worries and discuss tomorrow. Having a worry monster or place to keep worries safe will help with this.
- Do not demand sleep, instead talk about being in bed, quiet and calm. This takes pressure off the child to sleep and the restful state will encourage them to drop off naturally.
- One day soon you will have a teenager who you cannot get out of bed, this is a short time in the life of your child.

Example of a Bedtime Routine for a 7 Year Old with Settling Problems

- ❖ Aim for 10.5 hours of sleep form 8:30pm-7am
- 7:45pm, start bedtime routine. Keep routine calm
- Prepare bedroom so it is dimly lit
- Run a bath and have a 5 minute warm, quiet 8 relaxing bath
- Go straight into the bedroom from the bathroom
- Dry, into pyjamas & read stories & leave to read
- 8:15pm cuddle & kiss goodnight and lights out
- Aim for child to be asleep by 8.30pm
