#### Important Information about MCAS

From 17<sup>th</sup> April 2023, the only method for online payments, ordering school dinners or booking wrap around care for Hinguar Primary School will be via MCAS. The ordering of school dinners and booking before and after school wrap-around care clubs for the summer term (w/b 17<sup>th</sup> April 2023) via MCAS will be available from 20<sup>th</sup> March 2023. 
#### **Avocet Class**



This week, Year 6 have completed their final mock SATs before their actual tests in May. They have all applied themselves in a mature and diligent way to achieve their best. Well done, Year 6!

As a carry over from Aspirations Week, we had a visit from a Computer Game Designer who led a workshop where the children designed their own computer game character. We then continued this by encouraging them to create a story scenario for their character. There were some very imaginative ideas.

In Art, we have linked rhythm and movement to observe nature and sketch designs. As part of our Victorian study, we took part in an online workshop to explore the diversity of the population of England during this time period. Through studying census documents we were able to learn about




interesting people who lived in 1831 London; their birth place and occupation.








#### Seahorse Class








As a class, we debated whether the Gingerbread Man should have spoken to and/or trusted the fox. This led to a conversation on strangers. We discussed how we should not talk to people we do not know, however, we also decided there were some strangers that we could talk to e.g. Policeman, Fireman, Doctor.



In Literacy, the children have been drawing family portraits and using their phonic skills to write a relevant sentence. We have also looked at how to read words ending in -ing, -s and -es. Using Now Press Play, the children became the Grandpa who made the Gingerbread Man, before performing the story. We have also watched a musical retelling of the story played by musicians from the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra.





Throughout the week, the children have completed puzzles, drawn gingerbread men, role-played doctors, moulded with ginger scented playdough and built dens. In PE, the children have been working in teams to try and catch a ball.

#### Starfish Class



This week in Starfish class, our story focus has been The Gruffalo.

There has been lots of discussion around the different animals in the story. We thought about what noises the animals might make and how they might move around the deep dark wood. We took turns to play an animal game where we thought of an animal, then acted out movements and sounds for our friends to guess which animal we were pretending to be.

Our messy play tray was set up as a woodland kitchen with various cereals and herbs to spark the children's imagination to create some delicious woodland recipes. We thought about the

different utensils and ingredients we might need to create our recipes. The children used language relating to the measurement of time whilst discussing the process of following a recipe.

We have been developing our fine motor and scissor skills while cutting leaf shapes and have been comparing amounts when looking at groups of animals.

We listened to the story of the Gruffalo's Child to find out more about the characters. We spoke about the job of an author and illustrator and named the different parts of the book.

Our story focus next week is We're Going On A Bear Hunt.







## Seagull Class



We have had a busy and varied week, this week. In our computer lesson, we explored the straight line and fill tools to create our own art work inspired by Mondrian.







On Tuesday, we were fortunate to have the opportunity to work with Rob Glenister, who works in the video game industry, adding sound

effects to video games. He talked to the children about his job and the process involved in developing new games. He challenged the children to design their own character and think about the world they would inhabit.





Also, this week, we have been exploring how our

bodies change when we exercise. The children completed challenges involving coordination, balance and cardio.

We reflected on the effect on their body after each activity.

#### Sanderling Class





A fantastic week, Year 5.

In English, the class are preparing to write their own narrative inspired by 'Can You Catch a Mermaid'. We have looked at dialogue between two characters and today they wrote a character description for one of their characters. Next week, they will be writing their narratives.



In Maths, we have been learning about perimeter and area.

In science, they carried out a science experiment on air resistance. The children investigated which material would make the best parachute for a toy figure. They dropped the figures from the top of

the stairs and timed how long it took for the parachute to reach the floor.

In Art, they have been learning about constellation of stars. Over the next two weeks, they will be creating a picture using water colours and string. I look forward to sharing the finished pictures next week, and to display in the classroom.

In History, we looked at Dorothy Vaughan, the first African American woman to receive a promotion and supervise a group of staff at the centre. The children used computers to research.






