




In English, we have begun a new unit of work based on the animation of Alma. We will be focusing on developing our vocabulary and the



This week, the children have been learning about multiplication. We have discussed multiplication as repeated addition and counted in groups of 2, 5 and 10.

In English this week, we are learning a new story; Katie Morag Delivers the Mail. We have been looking at features of a postcard and writing postcards as a character in role.

The children have enjoyed participating in lots of drama activities pretending to be characters in the story and answering hot seat questions as the characters in the book.

In RE, we have been asking the question, 'What does it mean to belong to a faith community?' The children started the unit by mind-mapping their thoughts. We will be revisiting these mind maps and adding to them throughout the term.

Curlew Class



We have kickstarted the new term by starting a number of new topics/themes.

Our main topic this term is 'Emperors and Empires' and we started learning about the ancient Romans. We identified Italy and Rome on a map of Europe and sequenced the key events of ancient Roman history. We then heard about the legend of Romulus and Remus and the story of how Rome was founded. Everyone is looking forward to a great immersion day next Friday, when we are visited by representative from Portals to the Past.

In science this term, we will be learning about the digestion system within the human body. We started this by considering how food enters the body. We learnt about the different types of teeth we have and the different functions they have.

In PSHE, we are learning to be a 'compassionate class' towards animals. We considered what is meant by being 'compassionate' and watched an RSPCA video to introduce the concept. We also

learnt the 5 basic needs of animals.

Well done, Year 4 for starting our final term so fantastically (as always!)

Seahorse Class



This week, our theme has been Space. We began the week by listening to the stories Astro-Girl and Look Up and watched an animation about our solar system. We have learnt that Earth is the third planet from the sun, Mars is known as the 'Red' planet and Saturn has rings made from ice and rocks. We discussed that our solar system is called the Milky Way and that all planets orbit around the Sun at different speeds.

In Literacy, the children have used the sentence starter 'you can jump on the...' to write a space themed sentence. We have enjoyed listening to and discussing the Oliver Jeffers' stories No Way Back and How To Catch A Star. We have also begun learning Phase 4 within our phonics sessions.

In Maths, we have explored which numbers are teen numbers. We looked for patterns to explain why certain numbers were teen numbers and found that they all ended with -teen, when written they all began with a 1 (which really represented 10) and they followed the same order as 3-9. The children then ordered numbers 1-20, before Mrs Newman tricked them to see if they could see the mistakes she had made when rearranging the sequence.

Thank you to all the parents and grandparents who joined us for a spaced



themed open morning. We hope you enjoyed making rocket fruit kebabs, experimenting with dancing planets in a plate, creating a solar system and moulding with moon rock play dough. The children took great pleasure participating in these activities with you.

Throughout the week, the children have acted out a Now Press Play space story, role-

played in the space station, created rainbow-coloured potions and made pictures

with the new Tap-a-Shape equipment.










Starfish Class

We have been discussing different types of weather and have

We explored what happens when we mix water to dry materials. The children enjoyed creating their own mud for the cars to get stuck in by mixing water and crushed breakfast cereal.

We have been focusing on the initial sounds in our names. The children had great fun using a car to make marks. The wheels made great tyre tracks as they drove around their initial letter. We then thought about other words that have the same initial sound.

Our story focus next week will be 'Duck In A Truck.'

Well done, Starfish class on another busy week of fun and learning.











Seagull Class

A fantastic week to start our last term in Year 5! We started the week admiring our new wall vinyl outside our classroom: The world map and historical timeline. The children used the map to find modern day Greece and looked at where it was compared to



the United Kingdom. This proved a great way to introduce Ancient Greece as our new History topic in the summer term, looking into how Ancient Greece has changed from a Civilisation to a country. The timeline also allowed us to visualise chronology recapping Anglo Saxons and Vikings.

In Geography, we started our new topic, Magnificent Mountains. We discussed our prior knowledge of mountains and children shared their experiences/ aims for the future. Many children set their goals on Mount Snowdon! We then looked at mountain ranges in an atlas, starting with the United Kingdom and expanding to Europe. The children were so engaged and equally excited when they found a new mountain on the map, comparing the locations and height.

In English, we have started a new unit linking back to our previous topic of space. During the next three weeks, we are placing a heavy focus on vocabulary choice. This week, we have looked at alliterative dialogue, suffix power of three and feelings portrayed through Luna, a space cadet who lives with her father and has a vast imagination.

In Maths, we started shape. estimating, measuring and drawing angles. Whilst initially finding this

difficult. They were fantastic and showed lots of determination.


