Sensory Support

Bugs cause Fear

Sensory Explanation: This is likely related to an over- responsive tactile system as difficulty with self-regulation. When the nervous system is on the brink of flight or fright, unexpected light touch can be overwhelming. Also, due to the fact the bugs can unexpectedly bite, tickle, or cause a pain response in an unpredictable fashion, one might expect a fearful response. This can also be related to sensory modulated difficulties.

Ideas to Help!

- Respect this fear is real
- Encourage deep breathing during a big encounter
- Allow your child to remove him/herself briefly from the environment to come back to ready state.
- Talking your child through the situation will likely not help since he/she is in fight or flight mode.
- When your child is in a ready state and regulated state of mind, read books about bugs. Also, go outside to observe non-threatening bugs, such as ladybugs and butterflies.
- Encourage tactile based play with different textures, both wet and dry, with full body play if possible.







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




Kingdom of Benin has begun. Using the atlases, we located Africa and many of the countries within. We also shared our knowledge of Africa,






Seagull Class



This week in our science lessons, we have been thinking about the living things we have around us every day by exploring microhabitats. We discovered that a microhabitat is a small habitat which exists within a larger habitat. Each microhabitat has its own characteristics which make it the perfect home for the living things within it. We went exploring in our school grounds looking at three different microhabitats to see which living things we could find in each. Then we thought about why they might be in that environment and which characteristics help the living things to survive.





In our art lessons, we have been learning about the Wahgi tribe from Papua New Guinea. We discovered that their shields show images of the strengths they have as individuals. We designed and made our own shields, thinking about


superheroes who inspire us to be like them.

Seahorse Class



🌉 This week, our theme has been light and dark. We began the week with a discussion on sources of light. The children named sources such as: the sun, candles, lamps, a torch, fire, light bulbs and televisions. From this discussion, we discovered the words artificial light and natural light. We explored the meanings of these and found out that artificial light was manmade and could be turned on and off while natural light could not.

After reading Oscar and the Moth, we explored shadows and how they are made. Vocabulary such as opaque and translucent were explored. We investigated where a light source would be to create a shadow and how the

direction of a shadow changes depending on the position of the light source. The children then used torches to explore light and draw around the shadows of different toys.



Later in the week, the children planted a seed of their choice, before covering it with soil and watering it. As the children planted their seeds, we spoke about the importance of light on their plant. We planted 2 sunflower seeds in separate containers and have placed one in a dark cupboard and one in the light. We will observe what happens to these seeds over the next few weeks.

In Literacy, the children constructed their own sentences about the moon before using their phonics to write it. The children have been on a word hunt, copying

words which described light on one day and words which described darkness on the next. In the classroom, we have a new writing wall where the children are challenged to write words, captions and sentences each day.

In Maths, we have continued to look at teen numbers. After recapping the pattern and rules of a teen number, the children have been tasked to make teen numbers from the base of 10. We have used the sentence stem "13 is 10 and 3 more" to understand how a teen number is constructed; this provides the children with their first understanding of place value. The children have loved meeting each Numberblock teen number character through short animations.

Throughout the week, the children have enjoyed creating a rollercoaster from various resources in the classroom, writing rollercoaster tickets, building with Lego and painting the Wendy

You all deserve a relaxing weekend, Well done everyone!



Sanderling Class




We finished our sentence stacking lessons for the week. I was blown away by the quality of work written this week and the vocabulary used to deepen their sentences.

KS1 Seahorse Class having attendance of 96.48% and in KS2 Curlew 97.32%.




100% Attendance and Punctuality Prize
