Starfish Class

This week in Starfish class, our story focus has been 'Maisy Goes Camping.'

The children enjoyed creating campfires, complete with pretend marshmallows (cotton wool balls on paintbrushes) for them to cook on the campfire. We made our own tent by pegging fabric over the climbing frame and used blankets as sleeping bags in the pop-up tent in the nursery garden.

The children have loved exploring natural materials and loose parts to build, balance and create small world scenarios. The twigs were used to create shapes for tents and houses.

Just like being on a camping holiday, we enjoyed a picnic lunch in the fresh air and were very excited to be eating alfresco!

We created our own binoculars so we could take part in a scavenger hunt on the field. We found twigs, flowers, stones and looked for insects, birds and butterflies.

Our story focus next week will be 'Mr Men on Holiday'.








Seahorse Class







For the next 2 weeks we will be looking at 'Same and Dave Dig a Hole' which is a story used within the Jane Considine Literacy approach. This is our first time using this approach and the children have been amazing with the new style of learning. This week we looked at the first 2 plot points within the story, before the character Grandma Fantastic arrived to help us to explore certain words within the text. The children then discussed their own synonyms for these words, before using some of the words to write a sentence related to the plot point. This week we have explored words to describe dig, the texture of mud, eating and the taste of biscuits.

On the mark-making table, the children have been writing signs to stop people from falling down a hole, before blue tacking them to the window. They have cut out tools and matched them to shadows in a toolbox and created repeating patterns from coloured stamps.

In Maths, we have looked at adding more to another quantity. When working on this, we discovered there were a variety of strategies we could use to solve the problems. Approaches included adding the extra quantity on and counting the objects altogether, counting the original quantity from 0 then counting on, or subitising the original quantity and counting on from that number. The children used an interactive Maths game to add more aliens to a UFO.

Throughout the week, the children have created different sized train tracks, written post-it notes, moulded with playdough and made sandcastles and holes in the indoor sand.

Welcome back, Year 1!




In Maths this week, we have been working with numbers from 50-100. Recognising numbers and writing them in


order on the number line. Practicing number work at home would be extremely beneficial to lots of the children in the class.


Next week, the children will be taking their phonics screening check, they have worked extremely hard on various practice activities this week and I know they will all be amazing.











Seagull Class







Sanderling Class




In Maths, we have now finished our final decimal unit for Year 5 and are moving onto negative numbers.






school day, as well as the rules and expectations. There was also an opportunity to ask questions.









MFL Gifted and Talented at Shoebury High School

Children from Reception to Year 6 joined together to take part in an outdoor learning workshop, this week. They explored being creative using natural materials sourced from the school grounds.

Clay faces

Throughout history The Green Man has been used to symbolise rebirth and represents the cycle of new growth that occurs every spring.

Gargoyles or grotesques of The Green Man can sometimes be seen decorating churches. The sculptures most commonly show a face made of or surrounded by leaves.

The word gargoyle comes from the French word *gargouille* which means throat or gullet. Gargoyles were designed as waterspouts, to drain rainwater away from the walls of a building.

Grotesques are sculptures that that look unnatural, ugly or distorted.

It is believed that both gargoyles and grotesques have the power to keep evil spirits away and guard the buildings and those inside.







Hapa Zome

Tataki zome is a Japanese printmaking technique that uses the natural pigments in leaves and flowers to produce surprisingly detailed prints. Hapa zome, means "leaf dye" a term developed by the colour artist India Flint.

India suggests that it is an ancient art of printing and dying which probably has been used in many different cultures for centuries.

The prints are created by arranging flowers and leaves between two pieces of natural fabric. A hammer, or natural tools, such as heavy sticks and stones are used to squash the flowers and leaves until they release their pigments.

School lunch costs

I am sure you will be well aware of surging food costs and the difficult inflation situation we are all living with at the moment. This has meant uncertainty and massive price variability for our catering team as we continue to try to deliver the best possible school meals for the children at our schools. Schools up and down the country are having to significantly increase meal costs and this is impacting on families already struggling with the cost of living crisis.

With this in mind we are very pleased to advise you that we will not be increasing the cost of school lunches and this will remain for the school year 23/24. This is part of our support to you as families. We have been able to get to this point by working together as a Trust to make the most of our collective buying power and in house provision of catering. We hope this is a rare bit of good news in a world where prices seem to be rising almost daily.

Dinners are now available to be booked in advance on MCAS for the rest of the term.

The Dinners option and the Clubs & Trips option is accessible via the menu in the MCAS app and via a web browser.

If you do not have access to MCAS, please contact the school office who will be able to send you an *invitation code* and *link* to activate your personal account.

In July, end of year school reports will be available to access via MCAS. There will be no paper copies issued. Please make sure that you have activated your account before then to receive your child's report.

KS1 Seahorse Class having attendance of 94.52% and in KS2 Heron Class on 94.37%.




100% Attendance and Punctuality Prize
