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Gifted and Talented Art Workshop

14 children attended the Gifted and talented Art Workshop. We looked at this painting of drummers by Lubaina Himid with it's bright bold colours.



Who is Lubina Himid?

Born in Zanzibar in 1954, Lubaina Himid is a British painter who has dedicated her thirty-year-long career to uncovering marginalised and silenced histories, figures and cultural moments. She was awarded the Turner Prize in 2017.

The children were then given a small square section of the painting to try to reproduce on a larger square in their own style, using pastels. They needed to look closely to match shapes, colours and tones and had to work quickly to fill the whole space.









The children found the pastels challenging to work with and had varying degrees of success.



When we had finished, the pieces were placed back together and we could see the enlarged version of Lubinia Himid's work they had created together.

Starfish Class









This week in Starfish class, our story focus has been 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar.'

The children have enjoyed sequencing the story, exploring life cycles and discussing healthy eating choices. The children loved exploring the 'juice bar' where they pretended to make fruity drinks and smoothies!

We have experimented creating holes in leaves using a hole punch and used them for threading.

We painted paper plates to create our own caterpillar and explored symmetry painting to decorate some colourful butterflies.

We have been discussing transitions and have shared our favourite things about being in Nursery this year and what we are looking forward to next term. We displayed our butterfly wishes on our wishing tree.

Our cooking activity this week has been butterfly cakes. The children enjoyed mixing the ingredients and using jam and icing to attach the wings.

Our story focus next week will be 'Harry and the Dinosaurs Say Raah.'

Seahorse Class



This week, we have started a 2-week theme of pirates. We began the week by looking at pirate facts. We discovered that girls were thought to be bad luck on a pirate ship! We explored some pirate language and found that a landlubber is a non-pirate, booty means treasure and doubloons are gold coins. The children used their




favourite colour and animal to determine what their pirate's name would be. Later, a treasure chest with

coins and jewellery mysteriously arrived in our classroom. This week, we have listened to the following stories: The Dinosaur Who Pooped A Pirate, Portside Pirates and Pete The Cat and The Treasure Map.

On the mark-making table, the children have been drawing parrots to sit on their shoulders, created gems and jewellery and drawn pirates and ships. In Literacy, the children have designed their own pirate, before writing a sentence about its characteristics.

In Maths, the children have looked at money. We began by discussing what coins and notes the children knew. Most children equated money with shopping and the tooth fairy. As we looked at each coin and note, we talked about its value and the difference between the symbols p (pence) and £ (pound). The children matched coins and notes to their values in an interactive game on the whiteboard. They made money

from a variety of resources for the empty treasure chest. The children have also gone on a number hunt looking and recording the teen numbers under each pirate.











Seagull Class





This week in our English lessons, we have been looking at the poem, 'If I were in charge of the world'.

There were some interesting ideas during our discussion and the children really enjoyed having the opportunity to consider what could happen and the school, spider man would do to the impact it would create.




















Curlew Class



Before anything else, I would like to say a huge 'WELL DONE' to all the class for working so hard in their end of year assessment tests. They all tried their very best and each showcased how much they have learnt this year. I am proud of each and every fabulous foursey!

In geography this week, we have been considering settlement sites and the reasons people – past and present – chose specific locations to settle. Firstly, the children worked in groups to decide which factors are necessary for human survival (shelter, water and food), which are beneficial (eg healthcare and transportation), and which are desirable (eg entertainment and companionship).

Next, they looked at various settlements and identified the sources of shelter, food and water in each one. Then, they looked at 3 potential settlement sites and considered the pros and cons of each one.

A decision was then made about which site was the best and the reasons why this was the case.

To conclude our RE topic about Hinduism, we continued to find out all about the life of Mahatma Ghandi. The children read all about him and answered comprehension questions to demonstrate their understanding.

2 more weeks to go my fantastic foursies. Let's enjoy every minute before the well-earned rest. Have a lovely weekend.



Sanderling Class




After an exhausting couple of weeks, we have finally finished all of the Year 5 summer tests and can enjoy our final busy weeks together.




Information

School lunch costs

I am sure you will be well aware of surging food costs and the difficult inflation situation we are all living with at the moment. This has meant uncertainty and massive price variability for our catering team as we continue to try to deliver the best possible school meals for the children at our schools. Schools up and down the country are having to significantly increase meal costs and this is impacting on families already struggling with the cost of living crisis.

With this in mind we are very pleased to advise you that we will not be increasing the cost of school lunches and this will remain for the school year 23/24. This is part of our support to you as families. We have been able to get to this point by working together as a Trust to make the most of our collective buying power and in house provision of catering. We hope this is a rare bit of good news in a world where prices seem to be rising almost daily.

Dinners are now available to be booked in advance on MCAS for the rest of the term.

The Dinners option and the Clubs & Trips option is accessible via the menu in the MCAS app and via a web browser.

If you do not have access to MCAS, please contact the school office who will be able to send you an *invitation code* and *link* to activate your personal account.

In July, end of year school reports will be available to access via MCAS. There will be no paper copies issued. Please make sure that you have activated your account before then to receive your child's report.

KS1 Seahorse Class having attendance of 93.67% and in KS2 Avocet Class on 95.53%.




100% Attendance and Punctuality Prize
