

Next week, we will be learning about Diwali and Remembrance day.



Seahorse Class



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This week, we have explored the festivals of Halloween and Bonfire Night. The children were very excited to discuss how they would be dressing up for Halloween night, before revealing their trick or treating stories the next day. We then looked at Guy Fawkes and why we celebrate Bonfire Night. We watched a CBeebies firework display, before thinking of descriptive words to express what we could see and hear. In Literacy the children wrote these descriptive words around a firework rocket.





Later in the week, the children discussed fire safety when attending a fireworks display. Throughout the week, the children have been making bonfires, walls and houses using blocks and bricks with mud substituting as the cement! They have been using their memory recall to play pairs, and drawn a variety of firework inspired pictures.

In PE, the children have started our Dance unit, where they have been counting and moving their bodies to the beats of Head,

Shoulders, Knees and Toes. This week, we have also begun to practise our songs and actions for the Christmas Nativity. We will continue this over the next few weeks.

In Maths, the children have been exploring positional language. We listened to Rosie's Walk and identified the positional language within the story. The children then moved a teddy into different positions to further explore this concept. With



the classroom, the children moved themselves into certain positions depending on the given instruction.

Seagull Class



This week, the children were excited to take part in a Great Fire of London workshop. The children started the morning by sharing some facts they had already discovered over the last half term. The teacher leading the workshop was very impressed by their knowledge. This made a great base for further learning.

Then the children completed a Geography game, identifying significant places in London which were linked to the fire, such as St. Paul's Cathedral, Pudding Lane and the River Thames. Moving on the children found out about some significant people, King Charles II, Mayor Bloodworth and Samuel Pepys, discussing why they were important, how they behaved and role playing each son in turn



person in turn.

The children also learnt about fire breaking, which was one method used to slow the spread of the fire. Using drama they acted out being houses which were left standing, houses which were pulled down and the people pulling them down.

The children went on to improvise a variety of scenarios representing the interactions between everyday people from 1666.

Finally, the children got in character as Thomas Farriner, the baker believed to be responsible for starting the fire. In role, they explored what his day would have been as on the day before the fire and the contrast with his day once the fire had started.

The children participated beautifully throughout and made us very proud.






what goes on underground and have drawn our first labelled diagram of the unit.

Sanderling Class


