The children have been practicing their running on the play deck, retelling parts of the story and joined in together with Gingerbread dance

The children coloured in gingerbread men to practice their fine motor control and talked about the colours they used.



Seahorse Class



We have listened to the story from the giant's point of view, which changed how we saw the character. Because Jack broke into his castle and stole the hen and harp, we received a letter from the giant on Wednesday and a bunch of enormous keys. The giant could not remember what the keys were for; the children's ideas included: trap door, treasure box, jail for Jack and a cave.

Later in the week, we learnt the 'Fee, Fi, Fo, Fum song' and watched a Makaton animation of the story. We have also watched sections of the Cbeebies Jack and the Beanstalk pantomime. The children used Now Press Play to act out the story themselves. They have also planted beans in the hope of growing beanstalks!

In Maths, we have discussed height and how it is different from length. We used the specific language of tall and short rather than big and small when talking about our heights. The children were measured against a beanstalk height chart. We discussed who was the tallest and who was the shortest. The children have compared the heights of a variety of toys. We have also discussed how we could measure how tall or short an object is.

Throughout the week, the children have constructed marble runs, gone on number hunts, made puppets, explored ice and role played with the new box of material placed in the home corner.










Oyster Class

We hope you have a lovely weekend!










Seagull Class



This week in our computing lesson, we have been using spreadsheets. We learnt how to select a cell and input information. We also used the number pad and discovered that the technology could help us to solve calculations. We went on to solve a 'Make 12' challenge which involved finding errors in the data on screen and correcting it.





In our PE lesson this week, we have been working on making and holding a variety of balances. The children worked with a partner and were able to support each other in making each balance correctly and holding the balance for 5 seconds. The children went on to discuss how well they thought they had done with each balance and how they could improve.





In our Maths lessons this week, we have started to explore multiplication. We have been making equal groups and using our knowledge of times tables to help us to count the groups quickly and efficiently.

In Maths, we started our new topic Length and Perimeter and the children have loved measuring objects around our classroom.

In our PE lessons, we are learning to play tag rugby starting with the rules. The children have had a great time throwing the ball to each other and making sure they are using a w hold and throwing the ball backwards. We remember how to throw the ball by saying the rhyme "A rocket from your pocket' which we are shortening to 'pocket rockets' during activities.

It has been lovely to see the creative homework that has started to come in already this term. Well done, everyone.





Sanderling Class








This week in Year 6, during our Computing lesson, we had a visit from one of the IT Technicians from



If you are a parent carer of a child or young person with special educational needs and disabilities, it can be difficult finding your way through the system and getting information and answers to questions.

To support families, the Southend Council SEND Team hold monthly SEND Surgery events in locations across Southend. The events provide families with an informal opportunity to drop in, ask questions and receive help about a range of areas including:

- what to do if you feel your child of young person may have a special educational need or disability
- the support available for children and young people in education settings through the graduated offer, and what to do if you are worried your child is not making progress
- how to support and prepare your child for adulthood or transitions
- advice if you are considering requesting an Education, Health and Care Needs
 Assessment for your child or young person
- Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs)
- home to school or college transport
- services available in the local area to support you and your child or young person
- the SEND Local Offer website
- help using the EHC Hub, for parent carers of children with an EHCP

Surgeries are informal and friendly and provide a safe space for parent carers to drop-in, have a chat, and ask any questions.

KS1 Seahorse Class, having attendance of 97.92% overall and in KS2 Sanderling Class with 98.38%.




100% Attendance and Punctuality Prize
