# **Turtle and Starfish Class**


Goldilocks and the Three Bears Story Map Cut out the different events that happen in the story of Goldilocks and place them in order.



This week in Turtles and Starfish class we have been very busy learning about the traditional tale of Goldilocks and the Three Bears. We have talked about stranger danger and that Goldilocks should not have gone into the bears' house. We looked at the 3 bears and the children have learnt about the vocabulary of size, big, middle sized and small. The older children measured the bears and counted the cubes to see which was the biggest. We re-told the story using masks, Goldilocks, Daddy Bear, Mummy Bear and Baby Bear and also sequenced the story pictures talking about how the characters felt. In the story, the beds were too hard and too soft so we felt and sorted objects in the room into hard and soft groups. Outside we used the mud kitchen to create the 'porridge' from the story.



# Seahorse Class



This week in Seahorse Class, we have looked at the story Pigs Might Fly, an alternative version of the 3 Little Pigs' tale. In this story, the pigs made planes for a race, one out of straw, one out of sticks and one out of metal! The wolf wanted to win the race and tried to get onboard the metal plane. However, he mistook the engine for a chimney and was blasted into the

sky. During the story, the children have used the repeated phrase "I'll vroom, and I'll zoom, and I'll smash your plane in". In Literacy, the children thought of different ways the wolf

could stop the pigs' plane. After orally composing a sentence about their idea with an adult, the children wrote it and drew a matching picture.



We have watched someone wing-walking, before researching the different parts of an aeroplane. The children have also experienced a virtual take off.

Later in the week, we listened to the original story, watched a Numberblocks' version, and heard the story told in song. We have also used Now Press Play to act out the story, becoming each of the pigs and the wolf.

On the mark-making table the children have been drawing planes, passports, suitcases and tools. The home corner has been turned into an airport and aeroplane. The children have become pilots and sat in the 'cockpit' and used the typewriters to create tickets and boarding passes.





In Maths, we have explored the difference between odd and even numbers. The children discovered that an even number needed to be

shared into 2 equal parts, while an odd number had 1 left over. We have listened to the story Simon Sock, who was odd, as he could not find his matching pair, before using objects, stamps and ten frames to further our understanding of odd and even.

Throughout the week, the children have played with toy pigs in 'mud' playdough, used paint brushes in the sand to create letters and shapes, built planes from the large construction and played memory and matching games.

# **Oyster Class**





We have also received some fabulous homework for our Polar Explorer topic. Matilda was very excited to share the igloo she had made

with her classmates. Reuben discussed his igloo model too, telling us how it was made.

This week in science, we have continued to explore animal groups, focusing on amphibians. We discussed their main characteristics and what they need to survive and be healthy. We considered some of the ways young amphibians differ to their adults and the changes they experience as they grow. The children worked hard to sequence life cycles and label the main stages, describing each stage using the correct scientific vocabulary. We also considered how amphibians adapt to their habitats. This linked with our English work this week where we have started exploring non-fiction texts about habitats. We shared some informative video clips about habitats and the children practised their note taking skills. They then worked in small groups to create mind maps about their chosen habitat.

In our RE lesson this week, we have been considering why the Qur'an is so important to Muslims and how they show its' importance. We shared the story of 'Muhammad and his First Revelation'.







We discovered that Muslims believe Muhammad was speaking the words Allah told him to say and that these messages are the writings of the Qur'an. We looked at examples of Arabic writing and Islamic geometric patterns. We combined all this information to create our own decorative plates sharing our own special words. Each child selected four words which reflect something important to them and included these special words in their plate design.

This week in Year 3, we have been keen investigators. In our science lessons we wanted to investigate whether people with longer femurs can jump the furthest. We started off by measuring each other's femur in cm and then we went into the playground to jump. We discussed what we would need to make our test fair and how our test would change each time. The children had an amazing time outside jumping as far as they could and then measuring the distances.

In our Maths lessons, we have been learning about perimeter.

The children have been working hard to measure and calculate the perimeter of various shapes and draw their own shapes with a set perimeter. Additionally, on Tuesday we were able to use the class set of iPads to practice our times tables.

Finally, this week, we have begun learning the songs for our performance in April. It has been lovely to hear how enthusiastically the children have taken to the songs and how quickly they have been learning them.








# Sanderling Class






# Avocet Class




