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Forest School

Forest School

The children are enjoying taking part in their weekly forest school sessions and have had the chance to experience activities, including using tools, cooking on a campfire, den building, making natural dye for tie dying and creating crafts using natural materials.

The origins of Forest School can be traced back to Denmark, where it was initially designed for pre-school children.

The success of this approach was observed in children who attended Forest School, as they developed strong social and communication skills, effective teamwork abilities, high self-esteem, and confidence in their capabilities.

These foundational skills were found to have a positive impact on their academic achievements when they transitioned to formal schooling.

The Forest School ethos is based on providing a unique and holistic educational experience for children in a woodland environment. It aims to nurture their development, confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences throughout the year, regardless of weather conditions.

As a result of the above, the children are likely to get wet and muddy and we want to ensure that they keep warm and dry during their sessions. Therefore, the children can either come to school dressed ready for Forest School on their allocated day in their normal school shoes, with appropriate footwear to change into for the session or bring a change of clothes/footwear to change into for the session. This will then mitigate them spoiling their normal school uniform and footwear.

Turtle and Starfish Class



In Turtles class, we have been reading Little Blue Truck and joining in with singing lots of number songs. We explored diggers and soil in the tough tray, just like the truck getting stuck in our story. We also counted how many animals we could put on the blue truck. We have been using lots of vehicles in our small world play and learning to share with our friends.





In Starfish class, we now have our big, beautiful number line from 0 to 10 up on display. We had great fun exploring colour mixing while painting on the glass on our balcony. We also cleaned up after ourselves! Our ook of the week was Duck in the Truck, who gets stuck in the muck. We acted out the story with our small vorld animals and some 'muck' in our tough tray. For our directed activity, the children rolled two dice and ounted out the animals up to 12. The oldest children have begun learning their phonics, focusing on listening arefully and hearing the sound the letter makes, rather than its name, starting with the most common sounds / /a/t /p.

Seahorse Class



This week in Seahorse Class, we have explored the topic of light and dark. We began the week, by thinking of objects that give off light. We noticed that some of the light sources were natural and that others were not. We learnt the word for these types of lights was artificial. The children have been introduced to the vocabulary opaque and transparent when looking at shadows as well as the position and direction light takes when casting a shadow.

The children used a torch to shine at a variety of objects to

see if a shadow was produced. In Literacy, the children marked where a shadow would be if the sun shone from a particular direction, before writing a list of sources of lights. We have



listened to the stories Oscar and the Moth, The Light in the Night, My Shadow and The Day I Met My Shadow.

On the play deck, the children have used a variety of materials to make tents and dens. They were quick to notice that some materials made their den/tent darker, while others were more transparent and let light in.

The children explored what would happen to certain colours when adding white and black. As they mixed the paint, they discussed how it was changing, becoming







lighter when white was added and darker when black was added.

In Maths, we have looked at a different strategy when adding. We have used the terms 'first, then, now' to explain how to add onto another number. The children then moved objects in a 'first, then,

now' frame to solve the number calculations. Some children also used this strategy, when given the number problem in a story.

As it is Allergy Awareness week, on Friday we learnt about allergies. We discussed the items someone could be allergic to, some of the symptoms they may face, and how we can help them to stay safe. The children became allergy warriors and designed shields to fight





the allergies.

Oyster Class



Year 1 have been very busy this week in both Maths and English. The children have been starting to learn basic multiplication skills through counting in 2s, 5s and 10s. In English this week, the children have become their own authors by planning and writing their own stories all about Little Red Riding Hood. The work produced has been amazing and we have seen some incredible adjectives used to describe the characters. Great job, Year 1!

The children thoroughly enjoyed their computing session this week. They were able to sort different shapes into categories and begin to save their own work. The children enjoyed PE this week, as they were focusing on their jumping.

We also thought about African animals in our computing lesson. The children were challenged to create an African animal picture using their mouse control skills. They discovered it was quite a challenging task!







In our RE lesson this week, we have been thinking about what religious stories can tell us about how to treat others. We shared the story of The Good Samaritan and discussed the behaviour of each person in the story. We thought carefully about who was showing kindness and who wasn't. We discussed the way we think we should treat other people and which person in the story we would like to be most like.

Also this week, we have been exploring fractions. The children have been able to show halves, quarters and thirds in a variety of ways using shapes objects and numbers.








Curlew Class

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Sanderling Class










Avocet Class

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
